ABOUT THE HOUSE

The North Star House is located on a portion of the former North Star mine, 1 mile from historic downtown Grass Valley on Old Auburn Road. By the early 2000's, The House was ready to succumb to the forces of neglect and nature. In 2003 the North Star House was donated to the Nevada County Land Trust for preservation, and since that time volunteers, work parties, civic and scouting groups have donated over 8,000 hours and significant resources to stabilize the house. In 2008 the non-profit North Star Historic Conservancy was formed to manage the rehabilitation and ongoing operations of The House. The Conservancy has its own 501c3 designation and it operates as an independent organization.

ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE & SUPPORT

The North Star Historic Conservancy is comprised of a volunteer Board of Directors with no salaried employees. In order to continue improvements to the site, we will expand our function as a public event site and look to continued generous donations from our supporters.



UPDATE: 2011 NORTH STAR HOUSE PROJECTS & GOALS

We've met several of our 2011 goals, but still have so much more to do!

Handicap parking spaces were added near the restrooms - a great boon on event days! - and a beautiful circle of trees was added to the south side of The House, adding much-needed shade for both The House and the Growers Market. The driveway circle on the east side of The House now has a beautiful green lawn, and the Gardener's Cottage has been updated for commercial rental.

PAVEMENT REPAIR

PROJECT COST: \$10,000

We need to expand some of our paved areas, adding parking and a safer entrance/access road.

GROUNDS IMPROVEMENT

PROJECT COST: \$12,000

Restoring gardens and working on the orchards will the improve the site for future events.

FILTERED WATER

PROJECT COST: \$4,500

A water filter for our new well will allow the well to provide drinking water on the site and enable the Conservancy to eliminate the cost of city water use. Two water storage tanks currently adjacent to the well can be repaired so that they may serve as a source of water for fire protection.

IRRIGATION

PROJECT COST: \$1,000

Irrigation around The House enables us to restore some of the historic plants and provide green areas for seating during events.



North Star House: Stabilized but largely unimprove - small events only.



HOUSE NEWS

The North Star House is Now Listed on the National and State Registers of Historic Places

In February, the North Star House was added to the National and State Registers of Historic Places. The State of California cited our exceptional qualifications under all three of their criteria for historic importance, a rare achievement.

The Registers recognize a building's 1) significant role in historic events or trends, 2) significant relationship with a historically important individuals, or 3) architectural importance. The North Star House was nominated under all three criteria, thanks to its role in the gold mining industry of the West, its relationship to engineer A.D. Foote and author and illustrator Mary Hallock Foote, and its famed architect, Julia Morgan.





Many of you have walked the grounds of the North Star Mine property. There are numerous trees and shrubs that date from the time of the Footes. Mr. AD Foote developed the landscaping on the North Star property in the early 1900s.

Most of you are familiar with his orchard. But did you know that the huge chestnut tree near the Gardener's cottage is a Colossal Chestnut? It is one of the largest varieties of chestnuts. It most likely predated Mr. Foote's arrival to the Mine as the cottage was built in the 1880s. Next to the chestnut is a California black walnut tree. Mr. Felix Gillet, a well-known Nevada City nurseryman, developed the Colossal Chestnut and the black walnut tree for commercial use in the 1890s.

In the orchard developed by Mr. Foote there are several Mission fig trees and an olive tree that still bear fruit each year. Mr. Foote had previously worked at the New Almaden Mine in Los Gatos, and so was familiar with the Mission fig at that location. Also in Mr. Foote's orchard you notice a Bartlett pear tree with a dead top. The top died in the 1930s in the Chicago Park pear tree blight that infected many local pear trees. This particular tree still bears small pears every year, even though it is not watered or fertilized. Many of the other trees in the orchard are Nevada County native wild cherry

plum trees, also known as the "Miner's Cherry". These trees are the result of bird droppings. Their large pitted fruits are great for jam.





When standing on the terrace of the house, the columnar variety of Southern Magnolia can be seen on the right side of thelawn area. Its height was measured and it was found to be the tallest of this variety in Nevada County. Several can be seen in the town of Grass Valley.

One is at the end of School Street, just opposite the brick wall of St. Joseph's Cultural Center.

Walking down the north steps of the terrace, one can see the tall tulip tree planted in the 1900s. Liriodendron tulipifera is a native North American tree prevalent in the Appalachian forest and also in the northeast area where the Footes spent their childhoods. The tree is named for its small flowers that resemble tulips.

Beyond the tulip tree several small fruit trees can be found. Each is marked with an ID tag. On the right, there are two persimmon trees and a hazelnut bush. On the left side there is a small pomegranate tree and a quince tree.
