
The other projects are replacing the kitchen floor and caulking the rock walls. The costs of these two projects will be for the materials used as volunteers will do the work.


Two of the many improvement projects being planned for The North Star House are renovating the Kitchen and adding a new Restroom. The Kitchen, which will include a small office, will accommodate food service and caterers for our many events. The handicap accessible Restroom will allow year around use of the HOUSE.

Undertaking complex projects like these takes more than a bit of planning and effort, every action seems to involve 10 more actions. These projects require revamping of the old electrical, mechanical and plumbing; including the installation of a new septic system.

The NSHC Board of Directors recently completed a review and update of our Mission, Vision and Goals to help guide our project and program work for the coming years. Key elements are below.

### Mission Statement

The Conservancy is dedicated to the rehabilitation, preservation and sustainability of the North Star House and restoring its prominence as a cultural hub of the community through the presentation of arts, history, education and performing arts.

### Vision

The North Star House is a historic building worthy of protection and restoration, but more than that, it is a rising star in the community! We, as a Conservancy, wish to embrace and celebrate its historical past and legacy within Nevada County.

While we seek to restore the architectural elegance of this Julia Morgan designed, California Craftsman style building and heritage landscaping of the property, our vision is to re-establish the North Star House as a cultural venue for western Nevada County. We are committed to opening the use of the property to the public by offering and promoting tours, events, educational activities and performing arts. Through partnerships with local and regional organizations and interested stakeholders, the Conservancy can continue to fund improvements to restore and preserve this rare historic feature.

### Goals/Objectives

#### Continue Preservation / Rehabilitation Efforts to Restore North Star House and Property.

Update Annual Work Plan (for Board approval) prioritizing improvements and maintenance tasks to both house and grounds.

Secure funding and implement improvements / work tasks.

Review / update governance system of Conservancy, including Committee structure, bylaws, staffing, facility use and agreements.

# Submit and Gain Approval of County Applications for Updating General Plan / Zoning Designations and Adopting Master Plan (Two Phases)

Complete final revisions to Master Plan / Project Description, conduct all pertinent studies and prepare County applications.

Conduct neighborhood meeting prior to filing application. Maintain data base of all interested parties and agency contacts.

#### Undertake Marketing Plan to Engage Local Community

Complete marketing plan to improve communication, update printed materials, recruit members and identify funding sources. Ensure plan targets future income streams at a level to sustain and advance needed improvements, maintenance and administration.

Prepare and distribute newsletter to updated membership list.

Plan / conduct receptions for major donors / prospective members.

# WE NEED YOU TO HELP US RESTORE THE NORTH STAR HOUSE!


The North Star historic conservancy has been making steady improvements in rehabilitating the North Star House. Last year we shingled the courtyard, refinished the wood floors and repaired the brick fireplaces. This year we have constructed a storage work shop and removed the deteriorated kitchen floor in preparation for rebuilding the floor and remodeling the kitchen. Now we are undertaking an important step to restore the structural integrity of the rock work.

We are starting to remove and repoint the mortar between the rocks on the outside of the North Star House. The house is 108 years old, and over the years earthquakes, snow, wind and freezing have degraded the original rock.

Master Stone mason- John Van Leifde will be leading a team of volunteer helpers to do this important job. He needs 6 volunteers to form two teams who will assist him in removing, power washing, re-grouting, pointing and cleaning most of the lower rock walls and columns on the house. The training sessions and work will begin on August 28<sup>th</sup> and continue on subsequent Wednesdays and Saturdays until the project is completed.

Learn the skills of old masonry and be a valuable volunteer in restoring the North Star House! And oh yes, there is gold in the rock work of the North Star House; the original Italian Masons had their pick of the tailings pile from the North Star Mine when the House was built in 1905.

# HAGUE HOUSE HISTORY

When North Star Mine owner, James D. Hague, died in August of 1908, his son, Billy Hague be came the managing director. In 1910, the new president of North Star, George Agnew or perhaps Billy Hague himself hired a New York City architect, Mr. Julian Peabody, to built a home for him, his wife Elizabeth and son, James. We do not know why Peabody was chosen. However, both James, his son and Mr. Agnew lived on the east coast. As manager, Billy Hague set up a new accounting system, conducted air drilling experiments and time studies of various mine operations. It was under his direction that mining operations were moved to the Central Shaft on Allison Road. The Assay house became a rental house and is still occupied. When A. D. Foote retired as mine superintendent in 1913, his son, A. B. Foote became superintendent under Billy Hague. A.D. Foote remained as Consulting Engineer.

When World War I started, Billy Hague joined the Army and died in France of influenza. A. B. Foote was then appointed manager of the mine. After Billy Hague's death, Elizabeth and James continued to live in the Hague House. In 1945,

a Foote grand daughter returned to Grass Valley with two children after the death of her husband. She moved into the Hague House with Elizabeth.

In 1929, when North Star mine was sold, A. B. Foote and his wife Jeanette were deeded the Julia Morgan house, several other houses and many acres. It is unclear who owned the Hague house at this point but it has been recorded that it was a rental.

In 1957, the Hague house changed ownership when Boyce Thompson, founder of Newmont Mining Corporation, purchased 700 acres of North Star property. The deal included the Central Mine buildings on Allison Ranch Road and the Hague House.

Thompson created Boyce Thompson Institute for Plant Research. Conifer physiology research was conducted in the Central Mine buildings. Director Mr. Vite and his family lived in the Hague House. The main goal of the research was to understand and control bark beetle infestations.


