### County to Consider Future of North Star House and Grounds! Presentation to Planning Commission on August 14

To all of our great supporters of the North Star Historic Conservancy (NSHC): Please help us to restore The North Star House and its historic grounds. The NSHC wishes to open this vital piece of our local history to the public. Our vision for The North Star House and property is that it gradually evolves into a cultural event center open to all.

To this end, the NSHC has prepared a master plan for the fourteen-acre property, which not only seeks to restore and rehabilitate The North Star House and grounds, but also allows it to be opened to the public in a phased approach. On January 16, 2014, the NSHC filed a series of applications with Nevada County seeking approval of the master plan and a zoning designation that allows public access to this historic property. If approved, The North Star House and grounds could be used for public or private events including weddings, conferences, educational classes, theatrical or musical performances, and the display of arts. Funds obtained from these on-site activities will be invested into the rehabilitation of the The North Star House. Our applications will be presented before the Planning Commission on August 14, 2014. #### **Historical Notes**

by Carole Miller

The historic mining periodical, "Mining and Scientific Press," was first published in 1860 in San Francisco. In the December 25, 1920 issue, the editor, E.A. Rickard published an editorial in "appreciation of the career and character of Arthur DeWint Foote of the North Star Mine." Excerpts of the editorial are presented in this article to grab your interest; the full editorial may be viewed at the North Star House.

A Yankee Engineer: Arthur De Wint Foote

"Among the pine-clad slopes of the Sierra Nevada, on the



Pacific side and overlooking the Central valley of California, is a pretty settlement called Grass Valley. It is a community devoted to gold mining, and is distinguished among other Californian mining centres as the locality where was started the first digging into hard rock for gold-bearing quartz in veins or lodes. The North Star Mine is 2500 feet deep, with a shaft

that is 6300 feet long from top to bottom. The North Star has had its vicissitudes, like most mines, but it has been yielding gold almost continuously for twenty-five years. Moreover, it has been a mining school to a number of engineers now playing a useful part in the world. The veteran manager of the North Star Mine is Mr. Arthur De Wint Foote. Mr. Foote is a representative American, in his ancestry, his early environment, his schooling, and the venture-some beginnings of his professional career. He is direct and outspoken, eschewing periphrasis. He speaks of men as he found them, and he has to deal with many kinds, but in all his dealings he asserted the essential manhood and self-respect that we like to consider peculiarly American.

Mr. Foote could look any man in the face, and if necessary, tell him to go to hell; but he did not say it too often, and he never said it without cause. He was always kindly and polite to those with whom he worked, either as subordinate or chief. His traditions and his education alike have given him a feeling of keen responsibility to the men whose work he directs and an appreciation of their troubles and distempers.

Mr. Foote's wife, the author, Mary Hallock Foote, described him this way: 'My husband could do foolish things with money, but he had a long-distance wisdom at times that money cannot buy. When things did not go quite right he would describe them humorously, not being a bitter person.'

We need more engineers like Mr. Foote, alert and sagacious, but also humane and sympathetic to those who work with him rather than for him; in short, the democratic ideal of industry is not serfdom but cooperation."


#### Volunteers are making it happen!

#### President's Message

If you stop by The North Star House any day of the week, you may see the many volunteers who are hard at work. From the construction work on the lower or first floor of the house, to the preservation of unique landscape features, to the maintenance of our fourteen acres, our hard working volunteers are doing all of this work. The efforts by these volunteers, along with donations of funds and materials, have advanced The North Star House from a deteriorating structure ready to collapse to a beautiful, sturdy building now on the National Historic Register.

One of the most significant improvements currently underway is a remodel to a portion of the lower floor. When the Conservancy inherited The North Star House, the building was open to the elements and had no operating electrical, heating, water, or sewer systems. Our remodel project will restore heating, cooling, water and sewer to the building. The key change is the installation of a new kitchen along with an ADA accessible restroom for use by the public. This construction work is being spearheaded and supervised by our Construction Committee, a collective group of hard working folks who are volunteering their time and muscle. In addition, a number of local contractors are helping with this project and have discounted the cost of their labor and/or materials in support of our cause. The Conservancy worked with the Nevada County Building Department in obtaining a permit for this remodel and ensuring a smooth transition from a vacant structure of historical value to a safe and code compliant structure open for public use. The Conservancy is anticipating this remodel project to be completed in late summer.

The remodel work is one of many projects being undertaken by our volunteers who are doing these tasks out of their love and respect for The North Star House. It is the vision of the Board of Directors that one day The North Star House and its historic grounds can evolve into a community event center open to all.




