President's Message By Joe Heckel Evolving to a Cultural Event Center

The vision of opening the North Star House and the historic grounds to the public as a cultural event center is a reality. The North Star Historic Conservancy (NSHC) received a big "thumbs-up" on our Master Plan from all five of our Nevada County Board of Supervisors on September 9, 2014. Now, we have the challenge of completing a number of improvements to the house and property so it can be fully used for public or private events including weddings, conferences, educational classes, theatrical or musical performances and the display of arts.

Opening the doors to welcome the public may seem simple, but operating as an event venue business is a new challenge. Since the NSHC was formed in 2006, our mission has centered on protecting and refurbishing the North Star House. We are now evolving into a cultural events center, which we hope someday will be recognized as a premier venue in the Gold Country. With the help of our members, donors and volunteers, we have every reason to believe we will be successful as an event center. Our objective is simply to generate the income needed for a sustainable business. Sustainability, in our terms, is not only maintaining a business structure to manage the property as an event center, but to allow the North Star House and other historic elements of this unique property to one day be fully rehabilitated.

To this end, our board is working on a number of projects in 2015 to help with this transition. There are too many to list, but let's start with the most significant. The board has prepared a new business plan, designed to address our operational needs as more of a cultural event center. A marketing plan has been prepared which identifies a specific marketing strategy for us to follow in future years. Our newly adopted 2015 budget was restructured to include expenditures for our operational and marketing needs (it tied the business plan and marketing plan together). Probably the most significant project is the lower floor remodel, which should be completed by spring and will feature a new catering kitchen, new restrooms, a new office, and an array of new windows and doors. Also, we're updating our website and have developed a new brochure.

Whew......we hit the ground running in 2015. Thanks to all of you who have contributed your time and/or money in these efforts. Anyone inclined to participate in this historical and meaninful movement is welcome to bring your talents, passions, friends, hat, broom, shovel, hammer, lunch and a lounge chair.

Soroptimist International \$10,000 Grant for Heritage Garden!

Soroptimist International of the Sierra Foothills (SISF) has warded its first Impact Project Grant in the amount of \$10,000 to the North Star Conservancy for the building of the Heritage Garden. This is the first Impact Project Grant given by the local Soroptimist group. SISF is a group of dedicated business women who raise funds specifically for the betterment of women and children by providing financial support to local, regional and international




2015-16 Mini-Campaign Launched

The North Star Historic Conservancy has identified a series of priority projects over the next four years that will need to be funded in order to fully implement Phase I of the NSHC's Master Plan, including the North Star House and the 14 acre historic property. The completion of these priority improvements will position the organization and property so it can fully operate as a

"cultural event center" and be in compliance with all conditions and requirements.



- New shingles for the west-facing side of the house
- A Fire/Security System
- Re-grouting of all masonry around the house
- Rehabilitation of the library
- New entry doors and kitchen windows for the courtyard
- Paving and re-surfacing for access roads and pullouts and improvements to north parking area
- ADA accessible parking, pathways to the house, and additional road signage
- Repair/reconstruct the irrigation water tanks
- Establishment of the new North Star Heritage Garden



We will be breaking up the work to raise this money with a series of 3 Mini-Campaigns over the next five years. We are off to a fantastic start on the first Mini-Campaign with over \$18,000 raised to date. You have seen the progress at the House. Want to see more?

Transfer of Property to NSHC! Significant Milestone Targeted for 2015

One of the most significant steps the North Star Historic Conservancy will be taking in 2015 will be to consummate the transfer of title of the 14 acre site to NSHC from the Bear Yuba Land Trust (BYLT). When the NSHC was formed in 2006, a Purchase Agreement was executed with BYLT, formerly the Nevada County Land Trust, in which ownership of the 14 acre site would be officially transferred to NSHC. The agreement had a number of milestones for NSHC to address before the transfer could occur, largely to ensure the NSHC was economically and legally viable to take over the stewardship of the North Star House and property. The milestones included investing at least \$1,000,000

of improvement and volunteer labor on site, having an adopted Master Plan governing the future use of the property, having a Business Plan, and Capital Campaign Plan. The NSHC Board of Directors is pleased to announce that these milestones have been addressed to the point where a formal request will be filed with BYLT by April 1, 2015. This is an important achievement for both NSHC and BYLT and speaks to the visionary efforts of past Board members and volunteers from both organizations who sought to protect this historic iconic feature. At this point, NSHC is extremely hopeful that this important milestone will be achieved. Stay tuned.....an announcement may arrive shortly!



Julia Morgan and the California Arts and Crafts Movement Part 2 by Johanna Kahn, M.Arch.H.

Despite the distinction of her world-class architectural education at the École des Beaux-Arts in Paris, Julia Morgan became better known for her instrumental role in the movement to create architecture that was distinctly Californian. It was through Arts and Crafts expression that Morgan demonstrated her signature ingenuity.

One prominent vein of the California Arts and Crafts movement that can be detected in Morgan's work evokes a strongly Mediterranean character, specifically the influence of Spanish, Italian, and French architectural traditions. Beginning in the 1870s, the California

nia-Mediterranean comparison was used as a promotional device to celebrate the state's scenery and climate, but this analogy was applied primarily to southern California. California's Hispanic heritage, however, was not exclusively southern, and a new interest in the Spanish missions brought about the Mission Revival Style. In San Francisco, it gained popularity in 1894 when several mission-inspired buildings were exhibited

at the Midwinter Fair and when "Mission Style" furniture was first designed for the city's Swedenborgian Church of the New Jerusalem. The multifaceted Mediterranean analogy extended to northern California and reached San Francisco in the early 20th century. This is perhaps best illustrated by the 1915 Panama-Pacific International Exposition in San Francisco, which conceptually represented an ideal city. (At this exposition, Morgan was involved in the design for the interior of the YWCA Building.)

Julia Morgan is remembered first and foremost as an

Arts and Crafts architect, and her contribution to the California Arts and Crafts movement cannot be overstated. While not every Morgan building can or should be classified as "Arts and Crafts," she embraced that international movement early in her career, and its sustained influence is an essential characteristic of her life's work.



We have closed up all the floors, repaired a lot of rotten wood, reseated some large beams installed during the old school days of the house, and framed in many new walls. We have two projects left to wrap-up: electrical and changes to the new North Star Historic Conservancy/ Event Planning office. Many thanks to our volunteers: Ron Breeden, Dick Vasey, Bob Rhodes, Adam, Doug Young, Don Dumas, Chuck Field, Tim Colbert, Craig Weaver and his father, Mike, and Bob Lawrence. New doors and windows

Peggy hopes that all of her experience contribures to her ability to promote the North Star Conservancys vision of saving and promoting a very significant asset to our community.


Doug Forster



Under the Covers at North Star: Update from Behind the Scenes

By Jim Bair, Board Member Highly visible progress is being made at North Star House, ranging from the kitchen and bathrooms to the pergola and new courtyard doors and windows. Other progress is not as visible, but crucial to our transition to a cultural events venue. When the County Board of Supervisors voted unanimously last September to approve the zoning changes and Master Plan for our 14 acre property, the second of a two-part lengthy process was set in motion. The first part was in gaining county approval, and the second part is to address a myriad of county requirements, prompting dozens of projects. The projects are diverse, including a Fire Protection Plan, code-compliant septic systems, handicap access, paved parking areas, exterior lighting, signage, etc. Just managing these projects is a huge job in itself. We have completed the Fire Protection Plan that details programs like vegetation management, road improvements, and standard traffic signage. We are in the final stage of submitting the Plan to the County, thanks to the professional expertise of Joanne Drummond, Director of the Fire Safe Council, and Terry McMahan, Deputy Fire Marshall, Nevada County Consolidated Fire District. Less visible efforts include a 14 month marketing planning program. Through the efforts of Lowell Robertson, Cheryl Belcher, Joe Heckel, myself, and the entire Board, a detailed Marketing Plan has been written that will be used to promote our property both locally and regionally as a cultural event center. The Marketing Plan is being integrated into an updated Business Plan. Not a small part of the marketing effort is the North Star House brochure, a trifold handout that is printed and will be on our updated Web site!
